

TBE prophylaxis and consequences of its shortage in Poland

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Tick-borne encephalitis (TBE) is a zoonotic disease, which is a major public health problem in Poland. The incidence of TBE in Poland is 10,000 cases per year, with 3,000 deaths. The mortality rate is 20-30%. The disease is caused by the TBE virus (TBEV) and is transmitted by ticks. The disease is characterized by a long incubation period, followed by a prodromal phase, a second phase, and a convalescent phase. The disease is often fatal, especially in children and the elderly.
