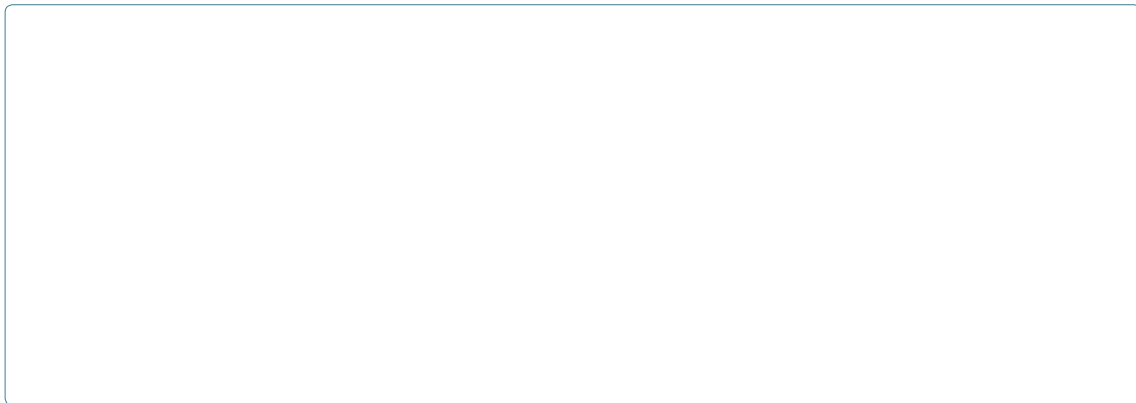


A Step-By-Step Plan for Resuming Suspended Clinical Allergy and Immunology Services

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Introduction

The purpose of this article is to provide a step-by-step plan for resuming suspended clinical allergy and immunology services. The plan is based on the experience of the author at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center. The plan is divided into three main sections: Introduction, Case presentation, and Discussion. The Introduction section discusses the importance of resuming clinical allergy and immunology services and the challenges associated with doing so. The Case presentation section describes a specific case of a patient who was unable to attend their scheduled allergy testing due to a change in their living situation. The Discussion section discusses the implications of this case and provides recommendations for how to handle similar situations in the future.

Case presentation

The patient in this case is a 45-year-old male who has been followed up by the author for several years. He has a history of severe allergic rhinitis and asthma. He was scheduled for his annual allergy testing on a date that coincided with a change in his living situation. He was unable to attend the testing and his services were suspended. The author discusses the steps that were taken to resume his services, including contacting the patient, scheduling a new appointment, and ensuring that all necessary paperwork was completed.
