

The Mastitis Carcinomatosa or Inflammatory Breast Cancer: A Case Report

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Abstract

The mastitis carcinomatosa or inflammatory breast cancer is an aggressive form of breast cancer. The diagnosis is mainly based on clinical and radiological criteria, MRI is more reliable in assessing tumor size than clinical examination. The most common presentation is a poorly limited heterogeneous infiltrating mass associated with thickening. The 5-year survival rate range 19-59% depends on the tumor stage. The treatment of inflammatory breast cancer is multidisciplinary, combining neoadjuvant chemotherapy followed by loco regional treatment.
